INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Board of Directors

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the financial statements of Canadian Mental Health Association Sault Ste. Marie Branch, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2019 and its financial performance, changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of my report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at March 31, 2019 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, Canadian Mental Health Association Sault Ste. Marie Branch derives revenue from donations, fundraising and other receipts, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization. Therefore I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues and excess of revenues over expenditures for the years ended March 31, 2019 and 2018, and assets and net assets as at March 31, 2019 and 2018.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Financial Statements* section of my report. I am independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The annual report is expected to be made available to me after the date of this auditor's report.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. As described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section above, I was unable to obtain sufficient appropriate evidence regarding the completeness of revenue derived from donations, fundraising and other receipts. Accordingly, I am unable to conclude whether or not the other information is materially misstated with respect to this matter.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am requried to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequare, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2019

The Canadian Mental Health Association, Sault Ste. Marie Branch, (the "Association") in partnership with consumers, volunteers and service providers, strives to make a significant difference in the mental health of persons living in the Algoma District through a range of services that include support programs, advocacy, mental health promotion and education. The Association is incorporated under the Laws of Ontario and is a registred charity under the Income Tax Act.

1. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

(a) Financial Instruments

The organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value and subsequently measures all its financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and term deposits and accounts receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at cost include accounts payable.

(b) Revenue recognition:

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recongized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions and other revenues are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amounts to be received can be reasonable estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Contributions related to expenses not yet incurred are deferred.

(c) Contributed services:

Volunteers contribute a considerable number of hours during the year to assist the Association in carrying out its service delivery activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

(d) Capital assets:

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Capital assets are amortized on the straight-line basis using the assets' estimated useful lives as per below:

(e) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates anad assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future. Significant areas requiring the use of estimates relate to the assessment of impairment of capital assets and the useful lives of assets for amortization.

7. Financial Risks

(a) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will be unable to fulfil its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Association manages to liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Association prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfil its obligations. There has been no change to the risk exposures from 2018.

(b) Interest rate risk:

Interest rate risk is the risk of potential financial loss caused by fluctuations in fair value of future cash flow of financial instruments due to changes in market interest rates. The organization is exposed to this risk through its interest bearing deposits. The organization manages this risk through investing in fixed-rate deposits of short to medium term maturity.

8. Economic Dependence

Approximately 75% of the organization's operating revenue is received from the Local Health Integration Network. The continuation of this organization is dependant on this funding.
